I have enjoyed the nostalgia of writing this article. In the last 20 years, I have noticed how much seniors are nostalgic. People look up old friends and get on sites like

"Forgotten Montclair" on Facebook. Nostalgia can be a "safe topic" when you are talking to seniors who are in an unhappy situation or who are experiencing increasing dementia. I am going to be nostalgic this month about my love of science fiction and fantasy.

As a teenager, I loved Glenview library because it had a whole shelf of science fiction, whereas Montclair didn't. I am not sure if it even had any. I also bought "Analog Magazine" (mostly sci-fi), "Fantasy and Science Fiction," and "Amazing Stories." My sister and I were not allowed to buy comic books, because we were fast readers.

I think my delight with sci-fi began with Rod Serling's "Twilight Zone" which started in 1959, 7th grade. I remember best a story about a spaceship caught in an eternal time

loop.

My fascination continued with the Greek myths in Mrs. Wolf's 8th grade English class at Montera Junior High. I put myself to sleep at night imagining I was a shepherdess who was madly in love with the handsome Apollo, who is a fabulous musician. He came down to visit me while I was sheep herding, one of the most boring jobs in the world, especially before books. I attracted him by making a lyre (a small harp) out of a tortoise shell. I suppose I used sheep guts for strings...not sure.

Both the Greek and Roman gods have been popularized in YA books (Young Adult) and now movie series about demigods, who are children born to a god and a human. As teenagers, their abilities start showing, and they try to get to a camp in a valley in Contra Costa County. The entrance is a service tunnel near the Caldecott tunnel. Invisible, of course, to everyone but the inhabitants. Greek demigods are on the West Coast. Roman demigods have their own camp on Long Island. If you want, you can send your grandchildren to real or virtual camps based on the books.

In my declining years, I have abandoned the Greek and Roman gods for the Norse. I love Thor, who as played by Chris Hemsworth, is handsome and charming. He is also much like Winnie the Pooh, who is a Bear with Very Little Brain. Did you know that Tom Hiddleston, who plays Loki, bulked up and tried out for Thor? He is over 6 ft. tall You can see the tryout on YouTube (Jimmie Fallon show.) He didn't have to try out for Loki.

The editors of the sci-fi magazines used to complain how science fiction didn't get any respect. They pointed out that there were some books considered main stream, even literary, but the publishers wouldn't advertise them as sci-fi.

For example, "Frankenstein." I consider horror stories to be fantasy as well. Recently I re-read "Frankenstein" in a Great Books group. Until then, it used to puzzle me as to why it has been considered literature since it was written by Mary Shelley in 1818. I learned it has "Important Themes", for example, whether you are playing God in creating life in a lab, the responsibility to your creation (Frankenstein

abandons his monster), and what it means to be human. Stories about robots who want to be human are similar.
